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

## You Are The Union

Good day my Sisters and Brothers. I write this Beacon article in a far different world than the last issue. Covid-19 has changed our world forever. 110,000 of our fellow Americans are dead and 45 million are without jobs and in danger of losing everything they have worked for. Parents, friends, coworkers, relatives and neighbors have gotten sick or died. We are in constant fear of getting sick ourselves or spreading it to others and we are not in our buildings to support each other or our students. A far different world indeed.

So, let me dive right in to tell you what we have been doing and where we plan to go. We have negotiated three different MOA'S (Memorandum of Agreement) and one letter of understanding. These documents cover Distance and Electronic Learning, Blue contract retirement extension, two PPD days to be used this school year for all Blue contract members and one PPD day for both contracts to be used next year and relaxed rules over Article 7 PD hours. We have been working tirelessly to ensure that all of our members continue to get paid and keep all of the benefits of their contracts including healthcare. We are part of the Agency's reopening committee and I attend all of the weekly administration leadership meetings. We have formed our own BEES reopening committee to hear the concerns and fears of our direct instructional staff. Many good ideas are coming out of that. We are also actively planning for all of the contingencies going forward as we look to reopen our schools in September. Please keep in mind that all of this is in addition to conducting our normal union business. Due to the rapidly changing nature of this crisis, the Executive board has been meeting weekly in order to deal with issues rapidly and effectively. We have also negotiated for our schools to close a week early on June 19th. All of this is in addition to performing our regular school duties. Needless to say, we have had some very busy days.

## You Are The Union

The Agency is moving forward with opening all offices on June 1st according to the state's phase one reopening plans. Washable masks (3) will be provided to all staff. That will give us three months to see how things are working out.

As you know the union's annual Retiree Honorarium was cancelled, but we will still be doing a few things to honor our retirees. Plans for opening day are still undecided as state guidelines have not been finalized.

Due to the economic depression, state tax revenues are way down. No one knows if the Federal government will be providing additional aid.

These economic factors will help determine what will happen. As of this date student numbers in our programs are still looking good.

We will be continuing to provide service to all of our members throughout the summer as we prepare for reopening. I remind you that our union remains strong. Our contracts are in place and we move forward together in support of each other and in solidarity.

Being on the Executive Board gives me a unique opportunity to speak with members throughout Eastern Suffolk BOCES and gain perspectives from all different positions within the agency. I can honestly say, there was not one person who did not pour themselves into their new roles when working from home. We thank you for your dedication to the students and the welfare of the families we service; it did not go unnoticed.

As union leaders we were faced with the challenge of getting information out to our members quickly, efficiently and accurately. We also started a closed group Facebook page to post information, answer questions and present recorded information to our members. Speaking of our webpage, we have also been dispersing information there since the beginning of the shutdown. The website has been organized, made more user friendly and has all the information we've put out since the school closure began. Finally, we have used our text blast system to inform members of all the rapidly changing information. You will receive a message back confirming you have joined the system; we never share your phone number or information with anyone else.

# Rising to the Challenge

First and foremost I want to extend my most sincere thoughts and prayers to every single one of our members and their loved ones. Every single one of us has in some way been personally affected by the Covid-19 virus. The degree to which we have been affected may greatly vary from one to another but I believe we can all agree that we have collectively experienced a serious "wake up"call. I do not consider it an exaggeration to say that it is likely our lives and the lives of our loved ones will forever be influenced by the experience of these last few months and the months to come.

At this time of year I would ordinarily be wishing some of our colleagues a happy retirement, or commenting on how fast this year passed by, or packing up our class rooms and discussing summer plans. Instead, this year the conversation has changed dramatically.

The announcement of a National Emergency on the afternoon of Friday March 13 brought a change to our teaching lives for what, we now know, would be for the rest of the school year, at the very least.


I recall that day so clearly; it was two hours before the end of the school week and the word spread very quickly that we needed to get 2 weeks of class work together for our students. Everyone in my program and parent program pulled together. It was a scramble, one that felt surreal and chaotic, but a controlled chaos. We all helped each other; making copies, stapling worksheets, putting packages together and making sure that before our students boarded the busses all were equipped with at least 2 weeks of work. What followed for the next coming weeks was, in my opinion, a show of unity, support and care from my colleagues.

We came together and supported each other. All of us; Teachers, Itinerants, Related Service, Assistants, Aides, Technical Support Staff, Clerical, Custodial staff and Administration. We did it together. We quickly learned what teamwork was all about.

We had new vocabulary like 'Zoom', 'Google Classroom', 'meets', and 'remote learning' added to our everyday conversations. We ran out to purchase needed supplies and accessories for our computers at home so we could set-up our temporary "remote learning classrooms." The texts and phone calls at all hours of the day poured in from parents, students as well as other teachers asking for help. The new tasks seemed endless; setting up deliveries of technology to our students, organizing envelopes of class work to be mailed out as well as the many late night efforts ensuring our work for school was scheduled and ready for the next day's remote learning lessons. We learned of new remote ways to have our staff meetings and Professional Development classes which took on a new "Brady Bunch boxes" look.

It felt like a mad rush for some of us who have not been trained or exposed to remote teaching techniques and platforms. We had to cram and learn about as many techniques, resources and platforms in as little time as possible. For some their working day went well into the evening hours. Other services, like Speech & counseling required instructors to get creative and figure out how to provide those services while being distant from the students. It should not be forgotten that all these newly faced stressors came at a time when our own physical, emotional and mental states were being assaulted by daily, omnipresent media reports extolling the growing and spreading threat to our lives and the lives of our loved ones.

It is more than learning how to write a story or take a test. Our classrooms provide an environment for our students to thrive, interact, socialize and communicate with their peers. They develop confidence, self-assurance and the building of self-esteem through interpersonal socialization and the bonds they build with their peers and teachers. It became evident to me that many of the students truly missed the daily connections and interaction they had when in the classroom.

At this point we do not know what next year's school start will look like. Regardless of the situation, if the past 3 months is any indication of what our members are capable of we will persevere and overcome any obstacle that stands in our way. We will provide our students with the same care, empathy and thoughtfulness that we have in these last few months of this most challenging school year. We will demonstrate, once again, the extraordinary value of a professional Teacher.

Thank you for all the effort and work you have put into these last few months. Together we have moved mountains and overcome obstacles. I am proud to say I am a BEES member.

# Many Thanks

Millions of people have lost their jobs and are struggling to meet basic needs and over 100,000 of our fellow citizens have lost their lives to this dreadful disease. Every single one of us has been impacted in some way and even though we must take some time to honor all those men and women who have served in the American military and died for their country, we must also honor those front line workers who risk their lives each day to keep us safe and alive. There are so many heroes amongst us. A simple thank you to them means a lot.

Speaking of thank you, I would be remiss if I didn't thank our President, Jim Beck for working tirelessly around the clock with help from his VP's to protect our members during this shutdown and transition over to distance learning. By working collaboratively with the BOCES administration, Jim was able to negotiate several Memorandums of Agreement in a short amount of time. These agreements put forth hold harmless language for our members and guidelines for distance learning and the implementation of virtual related services to our students. This, along with two pandemic personal days for direct instruction members this year and an additional pandemic personal day for all BEES members during the 2020-2021 school year. This, along with the ending of this school year one week earlier shows what happens when unions form collaborative relationships with management. In these cases, we all win!

School budget votes- For the first time ever, school budget votes will take place by mail in ballots. In an effort to keep New Yorkers safe, Governor Cuomo issued an executive order delaying school board elections and budget votes statewide until June 9, 2020. The school board elections and budget votes will be conducted by mail and all qualified voters will be sent an absentee ballot with postage paid. This will make it quite easy for all BEES members and their families to vote in these important budget votes. Always remember, if budgets fail and districts have to go on austerity, they usually cut back on the number of students that they send to BOCES, Last year, 123 out of 124 Long Island school districts passed their budgets. This was great for us because districts were able to send students to BOCES for Special Education and CTE classes. It will take you less than a minute to vote. Please support your local school budget.

For the first time ever, the NYSUT Representative Assembly was held remotely to ensure the safety of NYSUT members and to comply with the Governor's regulations. Even though this wasn't your typical NYSUT RA, we still accomplished some good things. For us here on Long Island, electing Ron Gross as the 2nd Vice President of NYSUT is good for us. Ron is a long time union president in William Floyd and also serves on the board of the New York State Teachers Retirement System. He has always had the interest of Long Island Educators in the back of his mind and we are grateful for the fact that he has moved up into such an important position.

This year, our BEES members reached an all-time record in voluntary Vote Cope contributions. Our members selflessly contributed \$29,750 to Vote Cope. These funds will go directly into the political action committee that supports elections of individuals who represent labor and educational issues. We fund both Republicans and Democrats who support public education and oppose charter schools. We want people in power who are pro-union, people who will protect our contractual rights, not taking them away. I'm proud that we reached this milestone and look forward to next year when we sign up new members to our union and hit the \$30,000 mark. Thank you to all those who contributed to Vote Cope.

This year we have quite a few members of our union retiring from service. Many teachers, teacher assistants, and classroom aides are leaving BOCES and moving into the world of retirement. As a result of union/management collaboration, these individuals will be able to take some very large sums of money with them as spelled out in their collective bargaining agreements. This, along with health insurance, will provide them with long term security as they transition into the life of a retiree. Even though we can't have our traditional end of the year honorarium, we still celebrate the careers of our fellow union members. Hopefully by this time next year, there will be a vaccine for this disease and we can have these members join us at the Lands End in June 2021 where they can really celebrate. Congratulations to the BEES class of 2020.

For those of you that are working "virtual" summer school, I hope your experience is productive and worthwhile. If you're attempting to vacation like I am, I wish you safe travels, and if you're just going to kick back and relax, stay healthy and safe! I'll see you in September.

## It Benefits You to Know

Greetings valued members,

My thoughts are with all of you and your families during these trying times. Your union is working very hard with all of our members' interests at heart. Some things to consider while we negotiate these unprecedented times. Financial strains are felt by all, and some are finding difficulties with commitments to pay bills. As union members there are some things you can adjust to help with those commitments.

The I.R.S. has adjusted the requirements for flex spending accounts, the BEES beacon webpage has these changes posted for your information. http://www.beesbeacon.org/uploads/1/2/1/3/121340227/changes\_to\_flex\_spending\_2020.pdf

You can also consider reductions to your retirement accounts if necessary. Speak with your financial advisor for specific ideas that fit your circumstances.

Federal and State Tax filing dates have been extended until July 15, 2020 and can allow time for making decisions. NYSUT has a web page devoted to tax deductions you may not have been aware of nysut.org/deductions - it is a great resource for both now and in the future. Share these items with your tax preparer. You can also reference I.R.S. article 17 on their website for self-service advice.

Both retirement systems have some tools for members who find themselves with financial difficulties. Rules have changed regarding loans from your retirement account. These are big decisions and should be reviewed with your financial and tax advisors. You can access contact information On the N.Y.S.T.R.S. website; community@nystrs.org or by telephone 1-800-348-7298. In the event you have not opened an N.Y.S.T.R.S. account portal, now is a good time. For N.Y.S.L.R.S. members, the website is https://www.osc.state.ny.us/retire/members/ Telephone 1-866-805-0990

Whenever a crisis arises, scammers ratchet up their game. Be aware of scammers trying to obtain your information! The retirement systems, social security administration and your financial institutions are never going to ask for your information outside of their portals, most have a two factor authentication that will send a code to your phone or email account. If you are still suspect, contact the organization directly and verify the request.

For those asking about unemployment; our members are still employed contractually, which is a wonderful thing. Paychecks, insurance and benefits are all in place and stable. Many people in our communities are not so fortunate. Contractual employees do not qualify for unemployment benefits at this time because there is an expectation of employment in September. As your union leaders, we have reached out to state and federal representatives to find out if our summer school, or any other contractual members qualify for benefits in any way. At this time there is no clear path. Filing for benefits while still contractually employed may be considered fraud and can come with consequences. The board does not advise one way or another regarding filing; it is our job to provide you with the information we gather so you can make an informed decision for your personal situation.

We are diligently looking for relevant changes that affect our members. We will disperse any worthwhile information we find immediately. We are working to our best ability to meet your needs as best we can.

## More Than Membership

Return the application and you will receive your ballot in time to vote by mail. No absentee excuse is needed. There are Federal, State and local primaries in both parties across the state, AND at this time by court order, there WILL be a Democratic Party Presidential Primary vote for NYers on that ballot. There will also be in person voting for those who choose not to vote by mail. If you live out of state for part of the year, and still vote in NY elections, make sure you obtain your absentee ballot.

#### NYS CENSUS! MAKE SURE YOU ARE COUNTED!

By now you should have received your form to be completed by your household. Federal funding for public needs like education, libraries, highways, elections, social services, eldercare, community public health, etc. are linked to the population count. We will lose representatives in Congress if we undercount our population. Undercounting hurts our state! BE COUNTED now!
